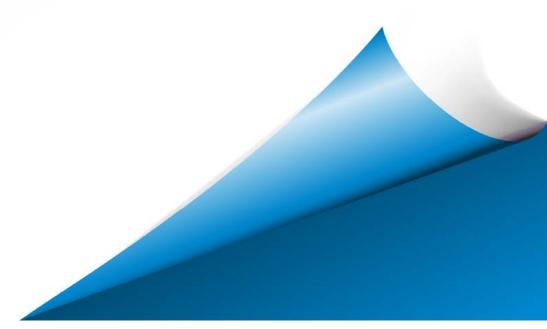

3 new Directives

- Public (Classic) Sector,
- Utilities Sector
- Concession Contracts

Published in OJEU on 28 March 2014

- 3 sets of Regulations

Scottish Government – Drafting Regulations and statutory guidance



Key Policy Options

- Selection and exclusion of bidders, particularly in relation to blacklisting.
- Mutuals new directives provide for certain types of contracts to be reserved for social enterprises and exempted from competition amongst the wider market place for a limited period.
- Supported Business –New rules allow for contracts to be reserved to businesses whose main aim is to socially and professionally integrate disabled or disadvantaged people. Further change is to the threshold of workers who meet that descriptions from 50% to be more than 30% of workers.
- Contract Award Criteria The new Directives provide an option for member States to insist that contracts can only be awarded on the basis of an assessment of both the price and the quality of a bid.



Statutory Guidance

The Procurement Reform (Scotland) Act 2014 provides for 5 areas of Statutory Guidance:

- Organisational Procurement Strategies and Annual Reports
- Sustainable Procurement Duty
- Community Benefits in Procurement
- Selection of Tenderers and Award of Contracts (including fair work practices)
- Procurement of Care and Support Services
- And Procurement Scotland Regulations (Set 4)



Statutory Guidance - Development

- Engagement public sector, suppliers, NGOs
- Fair Work live (1st November 2015)
- Other 4 building in feedback
- Commencement



Procurement Reform (Scotland) Act Expected Thresholds

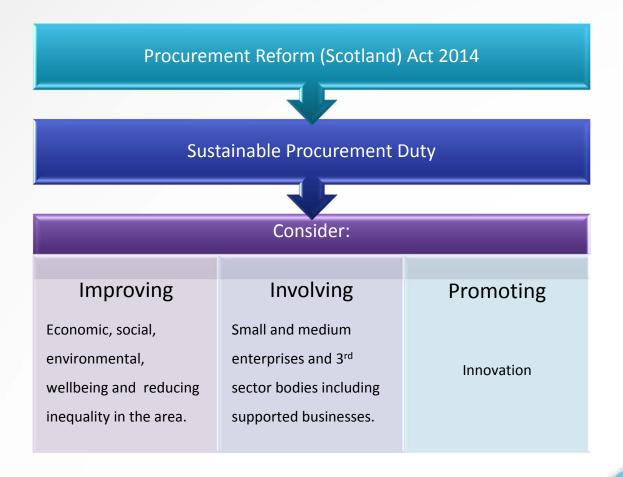

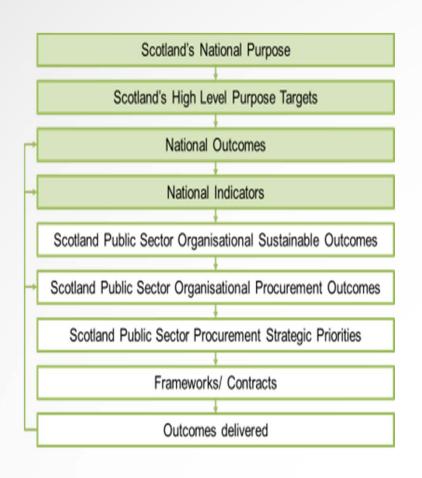

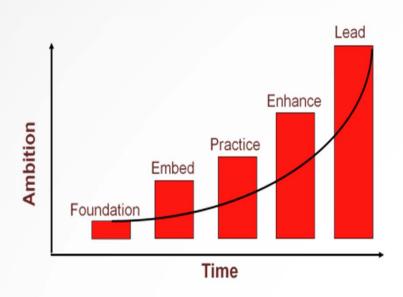

Maturity matrix



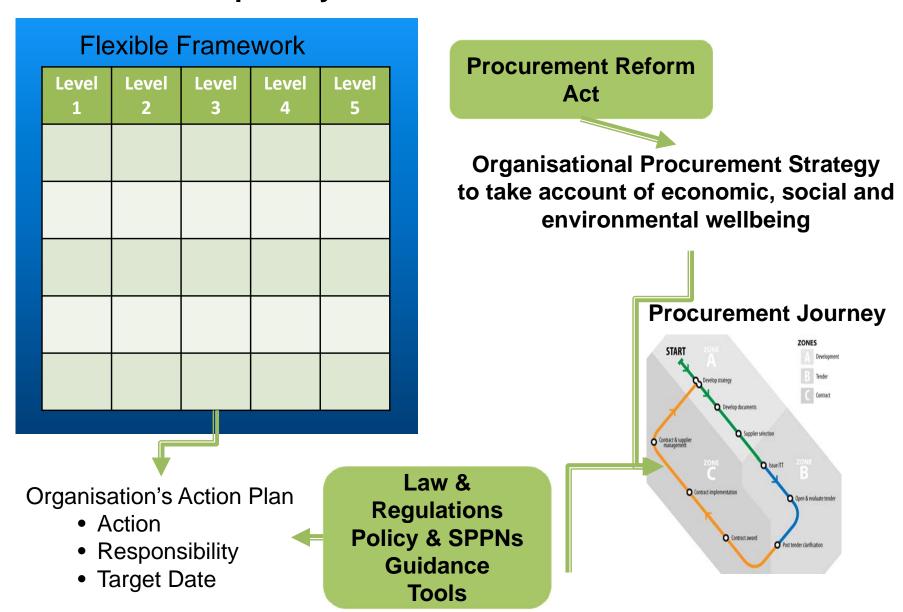

Building a Community of Practice / Knowledge Share – Aims through Champions Network:

Securing community benefits through service contract procurements:

- Share knowledge of what has worked well through interactive sessions
- Build practical application in service contracts
- Focus on focused / targeted scored community benefit clauses / criteria (horizon of "hard-wiring" via Procurement Strategies, Prioritisation etc)
- Contribute to maximising "reach" of 2014 Act



But also not forgetting....

Social considerations may be advanced through:

- Use of frameworks
- Use of the Supported Business reservation
- Use of Lots
- Focus on the specification
- Recognising that in certain circumstances, commissioning may not be subject to procurement law or may be under the "Part B / light touch" regime
